Sociology Major + CLS Minor Requirements (41 hours)

Students must complete 41 (overall) hours of Sociology (rather than 32) to complete the minor and major, of which 18 hours must be CLS related courses.

*SOC 100 - If using transfer credit, some schools grant only 3 credits.

***SOC 280** - can be fulfilled with these courses: STAT 100, PSYCH 235, ECON 202, MATH 161. Parkland College: MATH 108 and MATH 160. Note that these courses do not count to overall sociology hours, they only fulfill the requirement.

*Society and Law: If a course is used to meet this requirement, it <u>does not also count</u> for the Elective Requirement, but does count for advanced hours.

Additional Advanced Courses (300/400 Level) (18 overall)

Sociology majors pursing CLS minors must complete 18 (rather than 12) hours of advanced courses. The required core classes above provide 10 hours towards the 18 overall. Students will need to select at least 8 hours of which **one must be a CLS course**, see options listed to the left.

Supporting Coursework Requirement (12 hours)

Supporting coursework consists of a set of courses which are themed, logically grouped, and which reflect, or support a student's interests outside of the major. *You must meet with your Academic Advisor before your Junior year to submit a plan.* Majors and minors outside of Sociology can be used for this requirement. Selected courses must receive a letter grade, they cannot be credit/no credit.

Area of study or theme:

The following courses *cannot* be used for supporting coursework:

- Sociology department courses or cross-listed in Sociology
- Applied art courses, such as courses on a musical instrument
- Courses that satisfy the foreign language requirement

Course Planning Tips

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- Aim for 14-16 hours each semester (about 5 courses)
- Become familiar with how to add/drop courses, I cannot do this for you.
- Google: How to Register UIUC for a step-by-step guide
- Degree Audit and Course Explorer are your FRIEND! Use Them!
 - Look specifically at the course/section notes on Course Explorer to make sure the section you're adding is not restricted to a certain major/student group.
- Figure out what balance works for you: Are you a morning person or are you more attentive later in the day? Do you like to have all your classes done on the same days, or do you need them spread out throughout the week?
 - Pick courses that you genuinely are interested in, not ones that you feel you'll have to "suffer" through
 - You can complete your degree requirements while also enjoying them at the same time the two aren't mutually exclusive!
