Greetings from Lincoln Hall. I have just completed my first academic year as department head, and it is a very exciting time for Illinois sociology. I want to thank Tim Liao for his support during my transition into my new role. The faculty members and I have wasted little time in our efforts to build upon the foundation that Tim laid in his previous two years as my predecessor. I am optimistic that we will continue with our efforts to prepare our undergraduate and graduate students,

strengthen our curriculum, grow our faculty with the best young talent, and provide unparalleled opportunities for our students. In January 2023, we hosted a full day retreat to set department expectations for research, teaching, and service, and to outline departmental goals. We also had opportunities to continue building collective community. By all accounts we are off to a fantastic start. I have also had the opportunity to communicate directly with a number of our alumni and I am grateful for their continued supported. I look forward to speaking with more of you.

We have three new faculty members who will join us on campus this fall. Dr. Christina Kamis, a recent PhD in sociology at Duke University, joins us after completing a one-year research residence at the University of Wisconsin as a National Institutes of Health T32 postdoctoral fellow. Her research is in the specialization of health disparities. In fall 2022, we conducted a search for two junior faculty scholars with specializations in gender and sexualities. Dr. Brittney Miles, who received her PhD in sociology at the University of Cincinnati, and Dr. Stefan Vogler, who received his PhD in sociology from Northwestern University, will be joining us. We are excited about the arrival of our new colleagues and look forward to the ways in which they will strengthen our department.

Our graduate and undergraduate programs continue to thrive. In the fall, we will have seven new graduate students, three more than last year, join us to pursue their PhDs. As a new departmental initiative, we were able fund 14 current graduate

students with travel scholarships to support their travel to, and participation in, the American Sociological Associations annual meetings. The students will have an opportunity to present research, develop professional connections, and learn about the latest sociological research happening around the world. Their participation level far exceeds any that we have had in our last five years.

Our undergraduate students continue to take part in research experiences with faculty members. A number of our undergraduate students have presented research, and some have coauthored with faculty members and submitted research papers for publication in scholarly journals. I continue to be impressed with the working relationship among our undergraduate students and faculty members and the quality of hands-on experience our students receive. Our undergraduate program continues to attract wonderful students and in spring 2023 we had 243 majors and 253 minors. We are indebted to our undergraduate academic advisor, Reba Daniels, for continuing to provide outstanding leadership and service to our undergraduate program.

It is my honor to announce our Outstanding Alumni Award for 2022-2023. The recipient of this year's award is Dr. Chloe Bird (PhD, '92, sociology). Bird is the program director of the Center for Health Equity Research in the Department of Medicine at Tufts Medical Center. Congratulations to Dr. Bird. You will find more about her achievements elsewhere in the newsletter. We also want to thank all of the graduate and undergraduate alumni who submitted nominations. Thank you for bringing to our attention all of the wonderful work that our sociology alumni have been doing.

As I close, I wish to extend a heartfelt thank you to all of our faculty members, staff, graduate and undergraduate students, and alumni who have supported our efforts. We are excited about the department's recent growth and optimistic about our future. Outstanding Alumni Award



Dr. Chloe Bird is one of the most outstanding PhD graduates from the department's PhD program over the decades. I joined the department in the summer of 1990. Chloe was still in the program then, and in 1992, she finished her dissertation titled, "Comparing women's representation in three health professions: Dentistry, medicine, and veterinary medicine," directed by Barbara Reskin, the 93rd ASA President, with Catherine Ross (a well-published mental health researcher), Joe Spaeth (a social organization scholar), and Ann Flood (now a medical sociologist in the Dartmouth Medical School).

Since her dissertation completion with honors in 1992, Bird has embarked on an extremely influential and impactful research career focusing on health and women's health, first serving as a postdoctoral fellow in the Health Institute, New England Medical Center and Harvard School of Public Health, before spending most of her career at RAND as a senior sociologist. She is now program director at Center for Health Equity Research, Tufts Medical Center.

She has published three books, including her first-authored Cambridge University Press book, Gender and Health: The Effects of Constrained Choices and Social Policies. By my incomplete count, in addition to over 10 book chapters, she has published over 70 peer-reviewed journal papers, most in some influential health and medical journals including American Journal of Epidemiology, American Journal of Public Health, and Social Science & Medicine, among others. In addition, Chloe served as a senior advisor on detail to the NIH Office for Research on Women's Health (via the Intergovernmental Personnel Act - IPA) in 2016-2017. She has also written extensively for the public. Many of her commentaries have appeared in places like Newsweek and Ms. Magazine along with reports published via RAND regarding the Return on Investment for Increasing Funding for Research on Women's Health.

Dr. Bird's research has been supported by major NIH grants. She was principal investigator on nine NIH-funded grants. She has led research on determinants of psychological distress and depression as well as allostatic load, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, health behaviors, HIV, and obesity. She has also published extensively with the Women's Health Initiative Trial, assessing the determinants of women's health in midlife and beyond. She currently leads a project, funded by the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute, engaging stakeholders in exploring policy approaches to reduce severe maternal morbidity and maternal mortality for persons with MediCal covered births. She is a co-investigator (CoI) on a team lead by another of her mentees examining the impact of interventions by quality-of-care collaboratives on maternal health outcomes across states; she is also a CoI on a study examining barriers to prenatal dental care in lowincome urban women with dental coverage through New York's Medicaid plan.

Because of the reach and impact of her research and her hugely significant public outreach, Dr. Bird was elected as a fellow of the American Association for Advancement of Science and a fellow of the American Association of Health Behavior, both in 2015. In 2020, she received the William Foote Whyte career award from American Sociological Association Section on Sociological Practice and in 2021, she was recognized by the American Sociological Association with the Distinguished Career Award for the Practice of Sociology.

With this kind of high impactful academic research and public service, I cannot think of a more fitting PhD alum for this award.

Christina Kamis received her PhD in sociology from Duke University and spent the last year as a postdoctoral trainee in the Center for Demography of Health and Aging at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Her recent work examining the relationship between early life experiences and life course mental health has been published in the Journal of Health and Social Behavior, Social Science and Medicine, and Society and Mental Health. Brittney Miles is a Black feminist scholar who interrogates how intersections of identities are negotiated across institutions and inscribed onto the body. Her scholarship centers Black girlhood, specifically related to (a)sexualities, dis/ability, embodiment, and beauty. She uses interdisciplinary qualitative methods to prioritize the critical subjectivities of Black women and girls. Through her experiences growing up in the Cabrini Green neighborhood of Chicago, she learned to ask sociological questions about Black life and culture. She received her PhD in sociology from the University of Cincinnati. Outside of research, she loves television shows and movies and wrote her undergraduate comprehensive exam on all the Batman films—her favorite is Batman (1989).




Stefan Vogler is a sociologist who studies sexuality, gender, law, and knowledge. His research seeks to understand encounters between sexualized and gendered subjects and state and legal institutions. Dr. Vogler's work has been recognized by the American Sociological Association, the Law & Society Association, and the American Council of Learned Societies, with his book, Sorting Sexualities: Expertise and the Politics of Legal Classification, recently winning both the ASA Sociology of Sexualities and Sociology of Law Distinguished Book Awards. Prior to joining the University of Illinois, Stefan was a research scientist at NORC and earned his PhD from Northwestern University.

FACULTY ACHIEVEMENTS





Asha Sawhney and Jose Atiles - McPhail Collaborative Research Paper Award


This research paper award is given to a graduate student and faculty advisor jointly developing and submitting a paper for publication.


The Bastian Dissertation Fellowship in Sociology supports especially promising graduate students whose area of concentration is transnational studies or whose dissertation research is substantively transnational.
